

Shepherd Memorial Worship Concert



On Sunday, April 7, at 10 am, the Music Ministry of Vestavia Hills Baptist Church presents Classical Connections for the annual Shepherd Memorial Concert. We have the opportunity at this special event to celebrate the legacy of our church's beloved organist Betty Sue Shepherd, to recognize the contributions of our Shepherd Scholars who sing in our Sanctuary Choir, and to be reminded of the opportunity to direct financial gifts toward the scholarship fund bearing her name. This scholarship connects area college and university students with Vestavia Hills Baptist Church and the Music Ministry.

This special worship concert features our own Sanctuary Choir and a chamber orchestra comprising church members and community musicians. Making up the worship concert will be sacred musical selections that utilize familiar tunes from classical music repertoire by composers Bach, Mozart, Beethoven, and others. Shepherd Scholars will be featured as soloists and one of them will direct the Sanctuary Choir as well. To hear the original classical pieces that the program is drawn from, here are playlists to check out on **Spotify**, **Apple Music**, **and YouTube**.

The Shepherd Scholar program not only enhances the musical excellence of our Sanctuary Choir in worship each Sunday, but these scholars are also a part of the larger Vestavia Hills Baptist Church family through their participation in other areas of church life. These students are indeed recipients of a scholarship, but they are, more importantly, the recipients of the blessings of fellowship and support that is the heartbeat of Vestavia Hills Baptist Church.

Each Shepherd Scholar is awarded \$2000 per academic year, half of which is applied to their school account at the end of each semester. Gifts toward the Betty Sue Shepherd Memorial Scholarship Fund will be received during the worship concert itself on April 7 or they may be sent in directly to the Church Office. REFLECTIONS HOLLY HOLLY WITH HOLL

"To weep is to see. To be is to bow."

I discovered poet Christian Wiman at Christmas. I happened upon an article about him in the New Yorker magazine and quickly ordered his book, *Zero to the Bone: Fifty Entries Against Despair*. The New Yorker described Wiman as "among the most distinguished Christian writers of his generation." I have been reading his book of poetry and narrative - SLOWLY - in 2024. The words are too dense to read quickly. They take time for me to ruminate.

For the past eighteen years, Wiman has been fighting lymphoma. Whenever his cancer threatened to kill him, a new medical intervention saved his life. His writing, his poetry, and his reflection on other poets lived up to his subtitle; *Fifty Entries Against Despair*.

As I reflect on Holy Week 2024, I am deeply aware we go into this week with many in our congregation fighting against despair. We are in a season of significant medical challenges. Wiman's writing has



has offered new and unique angles demonstrating God's presence in despair. In his short poem "Reading Pascal in Quarantine," one line caught my attention.

"To weep is to see. To be is to bow."

in the weeks leading up to Palm Sunday, the Gospel of John tells the story of the death of Lazarus. Jesus enters his home brimming with mourners. Grief and pain fill the space. In solidarity, "Jesus wept." (John 11:35)

Later in John 20, Mary comes to Jesus' tomb griefstricken to anoint his body. She stands over the empty grave weeping. The resurrected Jesus comes to her and asks, "Woman, why are you weeping?" In her tears, she sees Jesus.

As we walk through the events of Holy Week, grief and pain surrounds us. Despair fills the air in the long night and day of arrest, trial, torture, and execution. Tears flow as disciples scatter.

"To weep is to see. To be is to bow."

In the moments where the God of the Universe hangs on the cross as a human and his body lays in the grave - God fully experiences what it means to be. **To be is to bow.** Our tears in this moment give us eyesight to truly see God at work; God's love revealed.

As we walk through the events of Holy Week next week, let's pay attention to our tears. May our tears strengthen us for the fight against the despair we feel. May resurrection and Easter not only fill us with hope and power, but also be reminders we do not fight despair alone. God is with us. God's love covers us.

This week, let me invite you to remember in prayer those among us fighting against despair. You can also join me on the **first Wednesday of Easter Season, April 3 at 6:10 pm** for a special service of prayer in the Fellowship Hall. We will spend time in intentional, guided prayer for those in our congregation and their families who are facing medical challenges. Let us lift their names to God together as we fight despair in the power of resurrection.



THE HARDY HOUSE

In 2020 when our pastor Gary Furr shared the decision of the church to name the home on our property the Hardy House in honor of Bob and Mavis Hardy, he described it as a place of "...hospitality, renewal, rest, ...an opportunity for guests to connect with the membership of Vestavia Hills Baptist Church."

This mission and hope for this house is lived out daily as missionaries, clergy and families find their way to the Hardy House. Currently, Jon and Debbie Moore, the parents of Ashley and Yates Norris, are living in the Hardy House. They have come to call the Hardy House *a home away from home* as they support daughter Ashley, her husband Yates, and their grandchildren, Faulkner and Jackson, as Ashley continues to receive cancer treatment and care at UAB and in Houston in the coming days.

The Hardy House provides a way for families to be together and support one another in times of need. Jon and Debbie are regular attendees now at VHBC. By sharing the gift of hospitality we are able to build community with new members of the body of Christ. When you see John and Debbie in worship share a message of encouragement and greeting. And when you think of VHBC and the ways we as a fellowship of believers are committed to be the hands and feet of Christ, think of the mission of the Hardy House. We've been blessed with a gift to share with others for rest, renewal and connection.
