SHEPHERD'S ENCOURAGER

Advent

As great events go, the birth of Jesus probably did not rank very high at the time that it happened. It's hard for us to imagine so great a moment slipping by without at least local news coverage, but apparently, only some shepherds and three stargazers from the east took notice.

As a child, it always seemed to me that the birth of Jesus must have been like our pageants—full of singing and obvious signs. I thought it would have had the impact of the strange event that happened in the sky last Saturday evening. I didn't see the light nor did I, for whatever, hear the loud sound. Apparently, a lot of people did. It had different effects on the observers. Police huddled with their fellow officers to figure out what they had seen. Astronomers and physicists theorized that it was a meteor or meteor shower. Truckers, according to news reports, pulled their rigs over and knelt to pray on the roadside, fearful that the end of time had come.

It's easy to think that the birth of the Savior would have been so apparent. Yet, for much of the world, the night passed as all nights dopeople sleeping, thieves stealing, and the earth turning toward another day.

Maybe it isn't the "special" part of this birth that was so important anyway. Maybe it was the "ordinariness" of it all. I can certainly think of "hope" in the broad general sense, but it is far more challenging to hold it close in the hospital waiting room next to a dying friend. When you connect spiritual affirmations with real life, they become more difficult to envision.



Kathleen Norris writes that "the Incarnation...is the place where hope contends with fear." In this life, things that don't come together easily somehow become fused into one place and time. Fear I can envision. Hope I can imagine.

But they are hard to hold in mind at the same time. The psalmist once wrote that, for the person of faith, "steadfast love and faithfulness will meet; righteousness and peace will kiss each other. Faithfulness will spring up from the ground, and righteousness will look down from the sky" (Psalm 85:10-11).

Somehow, in Jesus of Nazareth, things that do not hold together come together. It isn't easy to "hold it all together," is it? We're better at hiding some things and emphasizing others. We know how to create compartments and put our lives into them so that some things never have to meet and deal with other things. We have come to believe almost as a universal truth that there is always "more to the story," a "hidden agenda," or a discrepancy in every life between public self and private self.



What a miracle, then, to meet a man whose life is one of utter integrity. Who better to bring together heaven and earth than this man? Who better to live the fullness of life and face the darkness of death? Who better to reunite lost sinners with a loving God? How fortunate are we, said the writer of Hebrews! "For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin." In him, we realize that humanity and holiness are not a contradiction.

It's not the unusual aspects of this life that strikes me with such power—it's the ordinary ones. I'm not troubled by how quietly that birth night passed. I am encouraged. If such an ordinary moment can be charged with the holy, what miracle of God might be right here near me today in my life?

In this season beset with stress and strain, full of exhausting and mundane routines, keep looking. There are remarkable inklings of God that will surprise us—if we have eyes to see and ears to hear them. Join us in the ways we have, read more deeply, revisit the story, linger in prayer. Give generously to those in need. God is among us.
