NOTES FROM THE VALLEY OF THE SHADOW OF DEATH

Our church family lost two wonderful people last week. Betty Longshore went home to be with the Lord. She was 92. How we will miss her, but I choose to think she is home with her husband Les again. We had a simple graveside service last Thursday. Then on Friday evening, we met at the amphitheater outdoors for a memorial for Tyson Stewart, who died the previous Sunday morning at the tender age of 19. His cousin, Corinne gave a beautiful tribute, as did his grandfather George and his Dad, Mark. George read the following scripture during the service:

Isaiah 40:31 But they who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength they shall mount up with wings like eagles. They shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint.

Our church knew and loved Tyson and his family his whole life. We are sad and grieving with them. Reflecting on that verse, I said these things Friday evening. Maybe they will help you on your journey with sorrow.

"The first thing we must do is to remember our gratitude for Tyson—the joy of his life, to hold on with every fingernail to every story of his life because it was here. That will not be lost because God keeps it for us. I believe that.

The second is to proclaim hope in the middle of hopelessness. This is not the end of us or him. He made a profession of faith and it was alive in him. And as a preacher once said, it is not the hold we have on God that counts, but the hold God has on us. God had a hold on Tyson.

Third, we are here to believe that this emptiness and sadness and the tears are not all there are. They are real, and they go for a long time, but they are not the finish of us. It sounds so unreal to say that But many of us are in a place where we have

that. But many of us are in a place where we have been living right next to so many people who are not here now.

For me, it is becoming literally hundreds. I have lost so many people whose first names immediately bring up a lifetime of memories. I am who I am in part because of Forrest and Grandpa and Grandma, but also Charlie and Otis, Amelia and Philip my friend, and on and on the list goes. And in my chest the question, "They were so real, where are they now?" Classmates teachers and church members and family and friends. The question can hit hard.

There was life, and then it was not here where I could touch it. They spoke to me. I wrote down things they said. They changed my mind and sometimes the course of my life. How can they be gone? And so, we come full circle to something to hold onto here, a week later from the last perfect day with Tyson in the world with us—this love of God's is strong enough to hold him and all of them. "Nothing shall separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus." That's what Paul said.

We call it heaven, eternal life, but for forty-one years as a preacher, I have held to that truth as a life preserver --- not for my own physical life, but my hope. We're going to walk again. What is lost will be found. What was once desert will bloom again.

We've got a long road back from where we're sitting tonight, but we're going to get there. God is for us if the Bible is true. God has Tyson in his presence if the gospel is real. All the rest, the desert, and the terrible questions and the nights of my soul wrestling with this, we'll get through. But together, somehow, we'll keep going. And what we can't see yet, well, we will just keep walking until we do. Hold each other. And somewhere down this road, so wonderful but also so full of hard, almost impossible things to bear, we'll see clearly at last."
